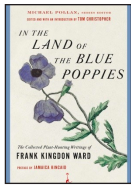




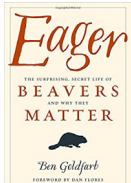

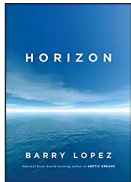
September 11, 2019

A collection of writings by the famous plant explorer, this book delves into worldwide adventures out of print for 75 years.



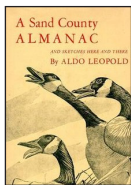
October 9, 2019

A book about the ecological importance of beavers throughout history, and what our landscapes today lack with their smaller populations.



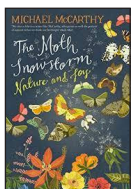
November 13, 2019

A profound influence on the modern environmentalist movement.



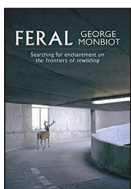
